
Russian history, society, and politics after 1991



TUITION FEES

In the Czech Republic, academic programmes taught in foreign languages are required by law to charge tuition fees

Sciences Po and Ruhr-Universität Bochum are our key ERASMUS+ partners with more partnerships in development




COLLABORATION WITH STANFORD


